The Re-Entry Team has had quite the task over the last 18 months. It has not been easy, yet they have done a magnificent job at making some very difficult decisions and I am so very grateful to them and their faithfulness to the work. We as a group have sought to err on the side of caution and care for our community and it has been a blessing to witness your support of it.

With the rise of COVID-19 cases in our area along with the number of "breakthrough" cases among vaccinated individuals (even among those in our congregation), we wish to go the extra mile in terms of caution going forward.

We are asking that *all* persons wear a mask while indoors at church unless eating, drinking, or using a microphone. This is a simple thing we can do to help all in attendance feel safe, especially those of us who

Trustee Update

As some of you know, we have struggled with water intrusion in the church basement for quite some time, and while some mitigation has been in place, it has

been insufficient to keep moisture at bay. That, along with lack of adequate ventilation, has led to growth unwelcome of some guests: aspergillus penicillioides. We had each room inspected for mold and each of them were positive, some of them at uninhabitable levels: the pastor's office, the workroom, the conference room, the Colonial Nursery School office, and the CNS 3-year old classroom. Immediate action is underway by the Administrative Council and the Trustees, relocating the CNS office and the 3-year old classroom to other parts of the building. We are communicating this to you so that if you venture into the basement, you will see why things aren't where they used to be and why some rooms are unavailable for use.

Homework and Reading Ministry to Resume

Anne Arundel County Public Schools are expected to re-open for in person instruction, and the Homework and Reading Ministry at Eastport United Methodist Church will be back as well beginning on Thursday, September 9.

There will be both continuity and change in the program. Now in its 13th year, the all-volunteer program will offer after-school assistance to kindergarten and selected elementary school children. Volunteers from the community and the church help students with their homework; provide the opportunity to strengthen their reading, writing, comprehension, math and analytical skills; and engage in other educational activities.

Participants will continue to meet twice a week: Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4 to 5 p.m. We will hold the sessions in the church fellowship hall, although we may use the picnic tables on the church lawn on days in which the weather is accommodating.

Starting this year, the program will be offered to children in kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and 3. It has been the experience of volunteers that these are the kids who have benefited the most from the program. We will be retaining those books that serve this particular population.

We will be introducing a new resource called Skybrary, a product of an organization called Reading Is Fundamental. Skybrary is a digital library, featuring hundreds of digital books, each with optional narration; real-world video field trips; standards-aligned lessons; and easy-to-use teacher management tools. It combines several key components that help children develop their literacy skills: high-interest books, read-to-me features, and encouragement for independent reading. The extensive library of books, videos, and lesson plans is designed for all students in grades K-3 across multiple subject areas. The church's WiFi has been extended to the fellowship hall to enable the use of Skybrary.

Members of the church can assist the Homework and Reading Ministry in two ways. First, we welcome volunteers! Volunteers are not expected to attend all sessions. They can come as often as their schedules allow. The program operates like a "one room schoolhouse." Volunteers are not assigned to any particular child, so participants have maximum flexibility in terms of attendance. All volunteers will receive a Zoom tutorial about Skybrary by the staff of Reading Is Fundamental. Second, folks can supply snacks for the kids. We conclude all of our Homework sessions by providing the children with a snack that they can eat on the premises or take home.

Our top priority is the safety of our children and our volunteers. The following COVID 19 protocols will be in place. All volunteers will be required to be fully vaccinated. All children and volunteers must wear face coverings during the Homework sessions. Physical distancing will be observed. These protocols may be adjusted to reflect the policies adopted by Anne Arundel County Public Schools.

Here are historical details about the program. The program began with two volunteers and two children. It has grown. During the 2018-2019 academic year, our last complete one before the pandemic, there were 67 Homework sessions serving 24 children. There were 20 "regular" participants — children who often attended. The average (mean and median) number of children was 13. On average, six or seven volunteers were on hand to assist the kids. The program has helped about 75 children during its existence, most of them for many years.

The program was inducted in the Volunteer Project Hall of Fame of the Volunteer Center for Anne Arundel County in 2011.



The church received gifts totaling \$65,000 to initiate a Neighborhood Children Education Fund, which is designed to provide an annual stream of money to support educational programs, activities and scholarships to enhance the learning and school endeavors of neighborhood children and especially those participating in the Homework and Reading Ministry.

Naked Church

During a recent Prays Band rehearsal we were working with our new sound system. The comment was made that the sound would "blow your clothes off," to which I yelled out, "Naked church!" We all predictably giggled like middle schoolers at the thought.

But while I'm certainly not advocating that we should attend church in our birthday suits, the idea of naked church kept coming back to me. For example, one of the very first stories in the Bible is of Adam and Eve's nakedness, and their attempt to hide it with a fig leaf.

So I began to think about the idea of nakedness in terms of some of the word's synonyms: defenseless, exposed, helpless. That's when it hit me. What if we really did come to church naked, in the figurative sense, allowing our vulnerabilities to show, allowing our full humanity to be exposed?

For me, nakedness feels like singing a solo. I'm very comfortable singing with my friends in the Prays Band. I've sung in various choirs over the years, and have even sung in musicals. But it's rarer for me to do it by myself. And that's when I feel very naked. There are no other voices giving me a fig leaf cover. It's just me, allowing my voice to be heard. And it might sound a little scratchy, or it might sound a little squeaky because I'm scared, it might get a little flat, or it might get real breathy because I feel like I can't get enough oxygen.

There are so many but, but, buts, that I often feel like I should never sing alone again. But I've also learned over the years that my community appreciates my voice, with or without a choir. I've been told that my singing has comforted folks, that it's made them emotional (in a good way), that it helped them in some manner. I have been thanked repeatedly because it meant something to somebody.

And so despite every fear I have, despite how desperately I want that *%##% fig leaf, when asked, I will sing alone – naked, vulnerable, frightened, exposed. Because a fellow human needs me to. What does naked look like for you? Offering a kind word when you feel tongue-tied? Helping someone who makes you feel inadequate? Turning the other cheek? Whatever naked is for you, then I urge you

to allow yourself the grace to embrace your

defenselessness, to shed your fig leaf, and find out how being naked helps you grow and connect with others. ~ *Barbara Krebs*

Our Community Heritage


Annapolis is a lovely city for many reasons, one being its appreciation and inclusion of public art murals. One doesn't have to walk far to see life in Eastport depicted in stunning murals at the Eastport Shell station, O'Leary's, along Boatyard, and at Trumpy Yacht Yard (Chart House). New murals have been added downtown including the Carr's Beach mural at The Maryland Cultural and Conference Center, a memorial mural at Pinkey's West Street Liquor honoring Carlester Smith: The Walking Man; the newer murals of Thurgood Marshall and Ruth Bader Ginsburg at the Courthouse, and Annapolis Taxi drivers at the Department of Transportation. These are just a few of the important stories depicted in murals, statues and public photographs which share Eastport and Annapolis stories.

Eastport Methodist's own Little Free Library will soon join these public art displays. EUMC has been given a Community Heritage Grant to tell a local story, and boy do we have a wonderful local story to tell! What is a Community Heritage Project, you ask? A Community Heritage Project aims "to collect, preserve, and interpret the heritage and history of a local community" usually through oral, visual, written and performing arts.

In the next month, our Little Free Library will be repainted to tell the story of two basketball rivals who became best friends – Roger "Pip" Moyer from Annapolis High School and Joseph "Zastrow" Simms from the state's black league. They crossed racial boundaries during segregation in the 1940's to grow a life-long friendship that took an extraordinary turn in April 1968.

As news of the murder of the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. spread across the region, DC and Baltimore erupted in riots and burning. Annapolis' young mayor, Pip Moyer turned to Zastrow for help, but first he had to get "Zas" out of jail, where he had landed after some illegal shenanigans. With the help of then Governor Spiro Agnew, Pip got Zastrow released from prison, and — accompanied by Annapolis' first African American policeman, George Phelps — they walked the streets speaking to the people. While DC and Baltimore burned, Annapolis remained quiet.

The design below, depicting the two men and their story, will be painted by youth artists from the Jovenés Artistas program at Maryland Hall for the Creative Arts. The front library doors have portraits of the men, the back panel (in tan) shows their silhouettes, and the two sides panels (in rust brown) tell their story. Thank you Moyer Family for allowing us to memorialize our local hometown heroes, Pip and Zastrow. ~ Susan Schneider

An Invitation from St. Luke's Church



You are invited to join in a time of remembrance and reflection as we mark the 20th anniversary of the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. This date holds many different emotions for each of us, and there is room for all of them as we come together in community.

The labyrinth is an ancient spiritual practice that is shared in common by many different cultures. You don't need to know anything in advance to participate, and you also don't need to be part of any particular faith tradition.

We meet at the log amphitheater just below the labyrinth for an introduction, and then we gather there again for conversation following the walk. Masks are OPTIONAL but encouraged for those that are unvaccinated. We strive to make our events as accessible and inclusive as possible. The grassy path of the Eastport Memorial Labyrinth is wide and flat enough to navigate with a wheelchair or walker. A hand-held labyrinth is also available as an alternative to walking.

Labyrinth walks take place rain or shine, so please dress for the weather! Labyrinth walks are held at the Eastport Memorial Labyrinth on the front of the grounds of St. Luke's on the second Saturday of each month from noon to 1 p.m.




